Dear Dr. Jennings:

On May 23, 1979, at the request of members of the Vice Presidential selection committee, the Professional Studies Council met to listen to a review of procedures followed by the selection committee for the Vice President of Academic Affairs. There was ample dialogue about this process, (and related events), between the council, the selection committee and the affirmative action officer.

At the conclusion of this meeting, our executive committee requested that I convey to you the deep concerns that exist among the faculty over the process utilized in this selection.

The major concerns are:

- 1. The "irregular procedure" utilized to select the Vice President of Academic Affairs.
- 2. The appearance this process has of circumventing a bona-fide established selection procedure.
- 3. The negative affect this process has had, and is having on the morale of the faculty.

It was the feeling of our council that although the process utilized may have adhered to the "letter of the law," it transgressed the "spirit of the law." There appeared to be unanimous reluctance from the faculty to serve on any similar committees in the future. Our feelings is that such irratic use of presidential priviledge has eroded confidence in the administration, driven deeper the wedge between faculty and the administration, and therefore contributed to a growing unhealthy attitude among faculty on this campus.

Since we all have an investment in the well-being of this institution, and wish to work closer with, and support our administration, we would be pleased to receive your written or verbal response to these concerns.
