WHEREAS, The major in Business Economics has become Southern Connecticut State College's most heavily enrolled undergraduate major and the Division of Business and Economics is experiencing greater enrollment growth than any other unit of the college, and

WHEREAS, Southern's plans for development in the coming decade call for emphasis on Business and Economics which can be facilitated by "school" status, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the existing Division of Business and Economics is redesignated the School of Business and Economics.

Justification for Converting the Division of Business and Economics to a School

The Board of Trustees, at its July 23, 1982 meeting, authorized the creation of the position of Dean of the Division of Business and Economics. It is proposed that the Division be converted to the status of School of Business and Economics. This change can be supported by the following items:

- Presently, there are more than 1200 full-time students working towards the Bachelor's degree in the Business and Economics program at Southern.
- These students are specializing in one of seven disciplines: Economics, Accounting, Marketing, Business Law, Management Information Systems, Management Finance, or General Business. Once the Division achieves the status of a School, the existing department will be divided into two departments as a first step towards adopting an optional organization.
- 3. A School status will be necessary in seeking accreditation from the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business.
