I have given to Eastern's Department of Music a Thomas Californian 251 two-keyboard, electronic organ (with Leslie speakers, percussion, and full bass pedals) and a Musser Century Model vibraphone. While I am not particularly concerned about acknowledgement or even notice of this gift, I do realize that the Board of Trustees must formally accept this donation since the combined value is over \$5,000.

I would appreciate, therefore, your placing this matter before the next meeting of the Planning committee. The vibraphone, incidentally, is that same set of golden vibes which Lionel Hampton played on--in trio with Dr. Drew and me-at the Convocation February 13, 1984, commemorating his appointment as Honorary Professor of Music at Eastern Connecticut State University, so the set does have some historic significance which may appeal to future generations.
