February 7, 1992


- WHEREAS, The faculty of Southern Connecticut State University have recommended Professor Geoffrey J. Martin for the title of Connecticut State University Professor, and
- WHEREAS, Michael J. Adanti, President of Southern Connecticut State University, recommends awarding this title to Professor Martin, and Connecticut State University President Dallas K. Beal concurs, and
- WHEREAS, Professor Martin, a highly distinguished scholar and teacher, has served Southern Connecticut State University as a professor in the Geography Department, while attaining extraordinary levels of achievement in research, scholarship, teaching and service, and
- WHEREAS, Professor Martin is known nationally and internationally as a leader in his field, serving as editor of Geographers: Bibliographical Studies (14 volumes published), considered to be the standard reference work on geographers from all parts of the world; editor of the History of Geography Journal (6 numbers published); Archivist for the Association of American Geographers; and is a founding and active member of the archival committees of the Association of American Geographers, and
- WHEREAS, Professor Martin holds an outstanding record of publication, having authored three books, co-authored two books, published a very substantial number of articles and more than 150 book reviews, and is currently writing what many anticipate will be the definitive History of Geography in North America, which will appear in two volumes, and
- WHEREAS, Professor Martin has been recognized as a leading scholar, having been awarded a Distinguished Geographer Award and a Research Honors Award by the Association of American Geographers, and having received several prestigious grants to support his research from such organizations as the American Council of Learned Societies, American Philosophical Society, Association of American Geographers, Smithsonian Institution, National Geographic Society and the National Science Foundation, therefore, be it





Additional to the above, I have published more than 150 book reviews; these have appeared most often in the U.S. and U.K.

My publications have been reviewed in several countries. Citations to my work have become more frequent since 1968 and must number in the hundreds. I am including a small sample at the request of Chairman H.M. Feinberg.

Work In Progress

Currently I am writing a definitive "A History of Geography in North America." It will appear in two volumes (The University of Chicago Press has requested first right of refusal). Volume I treats the period from the Amerind occupation to ca. 1945. It currently extends to 700 pages and is approximately 80% complete. Volume II covers the period 1945 to the present and is currently in note form. The National Science Foundation sponsored this project at Cambridge University, U.K. during the first half of 1990; the Cambridge University Geography Department has invited me to return to complete the project in the Spring Semester of 1992. A work of this sort has never previously been published.

A second undertaking is a substantial revision of All Possible Worlds. James (coauthor) died in 1986, and this new edition included several new chapters. It is a treatise on the history of geographical ideas from the Greeks to the present...and is adopted as a "base" for doctoral seminars in several countries. It has been translated into several languages including a recently "pirated" Hindi version, and there are two Chinese versions, one Malaysian and one Russian. The Russian Academy wishes me to participate in/lead a two week seminar in metatheory next year.
